

Sequoyah Ordeal of 2002

Saturday, once the candidates had been introduced to boiled eggs, the clans were separated into work groups who mostly cleared the dam throughout the day. Other projects included the painting of the front gate, the painting of the chain link fence around the climbing tower, and various other carpentry projects. The workday ended in the knowledge of achievement and a goal reached.

The weekend was beautiful, made all the more so because of the accomplishments of our Lodge. I would personally wish to extend grateful thanks to all who came, and to all who served.
